Past activities:

Lecture by the Consul General of Germany, Mr. Martin Eberts

On June 28th, we had the great honour of welcoming the Consul General of the Federal Republic of Germany (Osaka/Kobe) at KGU. Mr. Martin Eberts provided deep insight into how Germany was dealing with populating ageing and a declining population in Germany. The audience really enjoyed the lecture and Mr. Eberts received many questions after his presentation.

Europe-Japan Rural Entrepreneurship Conference

On July 8th, our last JMM event took place: the Europe-Japan Rural Entrepreneurship Conference, jointly organised with The Silitan Valley Consortium in Tamba. Jointly held

as Jean Monnet Module conference and the 1st Silitan Valley Promotion Seminar, it brought together a variety of speakers from academia and the rural entrepreneurship community.

The keynote speaker, Prof. Masatoshi Kato, Professor, School of Economics and Director of the Research Center for Entrepreneurship at KGU started off the conference with an insightful lecture on "Entrepreneurship and Regional Revitalization – Findings from Academic Studies". He showed which environments foster entrepreneurship, highlighting that also rural areas can be great breeding ground for startups. Prof. Kato's speech was followed by a presentation by Dr. Anna Schrade, Associate Professor at KGU's Institute for Industrial Research, on Social Innovation in Rural Southern Germany. Dr. Schrade presented several case studies of social entrepreneurs in the countryside in Germany's state of Baden-Württemberg and analysed why rural entrepreneurship is so widespread in southern Germany.

Following the two academic lectures, the audience had a chance to listen directly to the stories of three successful rural entrepreneurs from Tamba. The three panelists – all young 'in-migrants' from other areas of Japan – highlighted the potential entrepreneurship in the countryside posed and shared the background for their decision to start a business in Tamba.

Since this September is the last month that we're part of the active Jean Monnet network, there won't be any future events (and no future newsletters). Thanks for supporting us all the way!

For those who want to continue studying about the EU: some of the findings from this JMM will be published in as a book, titled *A journey through Europe: Societies, politics and contemporary issues in the EU*. In about 200 pages, Dr. Schrade takes the interested readers on a fictional journey through six European countries (Italy, Germany, Greece, Sweden, Romania, and the UK) and introduces them to some of the most pressing issues these societies are coping with. Published by Kwansei Gakuin University Press, the book will be available from September 2022 at a price of 3,000 yen (+tax).

Another way of learning more about the EU would be to follow the activities by KGU's Jean Monnet Chair, Prof. Holger Bungsche, which runs until September 2023.
